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# **NONSUCH GALLERY RENEWAL**

n June 8, 2018, the Manitoba Museum officially re-opened the Nonsuch Gallery, marking the completion of the first of four galleries to be renewed as part of the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Capital Renewal Project. The *Nonsuch* is one of the Museum's most iconic artifacts – both as a touchstone experience for Museum visitors and as a symbol of the creation of the iconic Hudson's Bay Company. Before renewal, the Nonsuch Gallery replicated Deptford, England in 1668. The *Nonsuch* was about to set sail on the journey that would eventually launch Hudson's Bay Company and establish global commerce in Western Canada. The renewed gallery sees this narrative changed so that the *Nonsuch* is now situated in Deptford upon her return from Hudson Bay in 1669. "We take incredible pride in our heritage, and the Nonsuch Gallery is the centrepiece to the Hudson's Bay Company Collection at the Manitoba Museum," said Alison Coville, President of Hudson's Bay. "The Nonsuch Gallery allows visitors better understand a milestone moment that helped shape our company. We are immensely grateful for the important work the Manitoba Museum does to preserve and share our rich history."

THE MANITOBA MUSEUM WAS AN INTENSELY BUSY PLACE IN 2018-2019 with a series of remarkable exhibitions as we commemorated the 100th anniversaries of the end of the First World War and the Winnipeg General Strike. We also celebrated the 50th anniversary of the Planetarium opening. On top of all of this commemoration activity, we reopened our iconic Nonsuch Gallery following a six-month closure, the first gallery of the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Gallery Renewal Project to be completed. We also played host to a major hockey exhibition. These are exciting times for the Museum!

The Planetarium's 50th anniversary represented an opportunity to connect with the science community, while the public enjoyed the long awaited return of Laser Shows. The Museum also partnered with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra to celebrate the 50th with Resident Conductor Julian Pellicano leading a musical escapade that transported listeners into the stars and beyond our galaxy. As well, the WSO helped celebrate the reopening of the Nonsuch Gallery with 17th-century musical selections played aboard ship.

Programs had a remarkable year having reengaged school/teacher audiences who are falling in love with the *Nonsuch* all over again. Public programs took centre stage with a series of successful Indigenous workshops led by respected crafters such as Jennine Krauchi and Mark Blieske who invited participants to engage with Museum collections, finding inspiration in artifacts for beading, basket making, and more. The Welcome to Treaty 1 program continues to grow in popularity as many organizations seek to respond to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action with hundreds of participants (social workers, nurses, bank employees, and municipal, provincial, and federal government workers).

Manitoba Day welcomed 8,600 visitors while the renewed Nonsuch Gallery attracted 4,400 visitors over the December holidays, who lined up for a rarely-offered tour of the mysterious cargo hold. We got "into the game," along with 33,000 visitors, for *Hockey: The Stories Behind Our Passion*, an exhibition developed by the Canadian Museum of History, which was complemented by an internally-produced mini-exhibition highlighting Manitoba's hockey stories, entitled *Manitoba: Heart of Hockey*, assembled by guest curator Candace Hogue and dedicated to the Humboldt Broncos.

A community partnership formed for the exhibition Vikings of the First World War: Icelandic Canadians in Service was complemented with a free-to-the-public display entitled In Flanders Fields: How We Remember. Strike 1919: Divided City opened as an intervention within the Urban Gallery. And, we

wrapped up our national tour of "Nice Women Don't Want the Vote," appropriately at the Manitoba Legislature. The exhibit was viewed by more than 70,000 visitors across Canada.

The Museum continues to advance community consultations, research, and development for the renewal of the Museum Galleries in the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* project. The new Winnipeg Gallery will open fall 2019 with the remaining renewal slated for completion by fall 2020. We are grateful to the Government of Canada, Government of Manitoba, and all our private sector donors who are making it possible for us to update the Manitoba story.

The Museum also established an Indigenous Advisory Circle, and we are grateful to those who have stepped up to provide invaluable insights, particularly for our work on new exhibitions and programs.

Albert and Samira El Tassi were honoured at the annual Museum Tribute Gala attended by over 300 supporters. They are widely known and recognized as sincere, passionate donors who work tirelessly to promote understanding, tolerance, and respect across the globe.

The Museum continues to be grateful to the 333 volunteers who contributed over 17,000 hours supporting every area of our operations. Their work helps us deliver exhibitions and programs to the 353,609 on-site visits each year (including 77,176 school visits).

We remain fiscally responsible. We have now posted our 27th consecutive year "in the black," providing a solid foundation as our capital campaign heads into the final stretch and we plan for our 50th anniversary in 2020 – a year in which the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Gallery Renewal Project comes to completion, a legacy project for Manitoba's 150.

Mark your calendars - 2020 is going to be exciting!

# INDIGENOUS CONNECTIONS

THE MANITOBA MUSEUM IS HONOURED TO BE ABLE TO SHARE the historical and contemporary stories of Indigenous communities in our province, stories that are at the heart of Manitoba's history. We have a long tradition of working collaboratively with Indigenous communities, and are committed to reconciliation and an inclusive approach to the representation, presentation, and interpretation of Indigenous stories and experiences at the Museum. Developing and nurturing respectful and collaborative relationships with Indigenous communities is an institutional priority and the Museum values its role as a trusted keeper of Indigenous artifacts, and as a partner in the sharing of Indigenous stories.

In 2018-2019 the Museum established an Indigenous Advisory Circle with the intent to cultivate strong working relationships between the Museum and Indigenous communities throughout Manitoba. The Circle helps to support and promote Indigenous inclusion in Museum activities and improve Indigenous representation in exhibitions and programs, with a sincere desire to advance reconciliation, and address and build on the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

The Museum has a variety of initiatives to share as highlights of 2018-2019:

- Joined the City of Winnipeg's Indigenous Accord
- Provide a sacred storage space for sensitive and significant Indigenous artifacts, at the request of Indigenous communities
- Offer Welcome to Treaty 1 and We Are All Treaty People programs based on the We Are All Treaty People exhibition established with the Treaty Relations Commission

- Collaboration and consultation with Indigenous communities to better represent Indigenous histories and stories in galleries being updated for the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Gallery Renewal Project
- Recognition of Spirit Lines, an education kit collaboratively developed for Garden Hill and Norway House First Nations with the International Guardians of Culture and Lifeways Outstanding Project (by a Non-Native Organization) Award, presented by the Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums (USA); in 2017, the project received the prestigious Governor General's History Alive! Award
- Beginning work on the next education kit entitled Nametwaawin: Land and Language, a Museum collaboration with Indigenous communities in the newly designated UNESCO world heritage site of Pimachiowin Aki
- Completion of a collaborative project with the Sagkeeng Anicinabe Government, Stories of the Old Ones: Hunter and Fisher from Sheltered Water, a book authored by Kevin Brownlee, Curator of Archaeology
- Indigenous Scholars in Residence Program supporting Indigenous graduate student research (now in its fourth year)





# **EXHIBITIONS**

THE EXHIBITIONS SCHEDULE FOR 2018-2019 WAS TREMENDOUSLY BUSY – from permanent galleries, to feature exhibitions, to travelling shows. The Museum reopened the beloved Nonsuch Gallery as the first to be completed in the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Gallery Renewal Project. The feature exhibition produced by the Canadian Museum of History, *HOCKEY: The Stories Behind Our Passion*, was hosted in Alloway Hall. The Museum's *Strike 1919: Divided City* intervention of the Urban Gallery opened with great acclaim, while the Museum's travelling exhibition "*Nice Women Don't Want the Vote*" concluded a very successful four-year cross-Canada tour at the Manitoba Legislature.




Hockey: The Stories Behind Our Passion feature exhibition in Alloway Hall.

The reopening of the Nonsuch Gallery, after two years of development, was met with great enthusiasm and included a variety of enhancements that intensify that feeling of stepping back in time. New lighting and auditory effects help to immerse the visitor in Deptford, England of 1669. In the Boar's Head Tavern, visitors "overhear" Captain Gillam and his crew regale the pub with tales of their adventures wintering across the ocean. Viewscopes on the new Pier allow visitors to appreciate the beauty

of the ship's construction and examine the new rigging and unfurled sails. A gigantic mural depicts the marshy Isle of Dogs on the River Thames, enlivened with new audio and lighting effects that simulate the passage of day and night and changes in the weather. Additionally, the corridor from Boreal Gallery leading to the Nonsuch Gallery now features 700 insect specimens and details the role of furbearing animals in the ecosystem

and the economy. An oral history told by Elder Louis Bird describes the first encounter between the Cree of James Bay and European explorers. The story of the replica ship's voyages through the Atlantic, Great Lakes, Pacific, and eventual journey to her new home at the Manitoba Museum is also told. Finally, a new gallery space has been created; the newly dubbed Nautical Balcony features a model ship display and highlights of the HBC's nautical history, and surprising stories about the scope and reach of the HBC beyond fur-trading.

The Manitoba Museum got "into the game" with HOCKEY: The Stories Behind Our Passion, an exhibition developed by the Canadian Museum of History. The history of hockey was brought to life through profiles of those who live and love the game, both the professionals

and the enthusiasts. A wide range of artifacts, player profiles, iconic images, memorabilia, and more, shone a light on the origins of the game, its evolution as a sport, and its enduring power as a cultural phenomenon revealing what our passion for hockey says about us as a society. Featuring 280 artifacts from both the Museum of History's collections and 50 contributing organizations, including the Manitoba Museum, Canada's Sports Hall of Fame, and the Hockey Hall of Fame, the exhibition also carried weightier messages about innovations in player safety, advances in gender equality, and shifts in cultural politics.

The feature exhibition was complemented by a smaller internally-produced exhibition highlighting Manitoba's hockey stories. Manitoba: Heart of Hockey was assembled by guest curator Candace Hogue. Artifacts included Jonathan Toews' three Stanley Cup rings and Olympic medals, Terry Sawchuk's Detroit Red Wings jacket, Jennifer Botterill's Team Canada jersey, Reggie Leach's Flin Flon Bombers blazer, and the recently game-worn equipment belonging to Winnipeg Jet, Patrik Laine, as well as the WHA Avco World Cup Trophy. The exhibit was dedicated to the 2018 Humboldt Broncos hockey team - those who survived and those who were lost.

A community partnership arose for the commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the First World War, Vikings of the First World War: Icelandic Canadians in Service. This 500 square-foot exhibit featured a multimedia video installation, To Pluck a Flower from this Peculiar Place, an artwork curated by Kristin Maria Hreinsdottir in collaboration with the National Museum of Iceland and the University of Iceland. Additional artifacts and archival documents from Manitoba Battalions highlighted stories of the Einarsson brothers, Joe, John, and Villi.

The First World War was further commemorated with a free public display entitled *In Flanders Fields: How We Remember,* which explored how we have remembered the war and those who died. The famous poem, *In Flanders* 

Fields, and its author Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae took centre stage in this small tribute that included a dried poppy collected from Flanders Fields in 1918.

Shattered Past: New Clues in the Mystery of an Ancient Pot featured a ceramic reconstruction of a vessel recovered in 1996 from the banks of the Winnipeg River. A slideshow detailed specialized reconstruction by conservators from the Canadian Conservation Institute.

Museums Choice: Fossil Favourites from Across Canada was developed by The Alliance of Natural History Museums Network in partnership with the Canadian Museum of Nature and Royal British Columbia Museum for a national tour. The Manitoba Museum, as a contributing member, loaned the world's largest trilobite.

Strike 1919: Divided City, an exhibition commemorating the 100th anniversary of the Winnipeg General Strike, was strongly supported by the community including the Government of Canada, Government of Manitoba, and many Manitoba unions. Presented as an intervention installation in the Urban Gallery (cityscape), this engaging exhibition has transformed this space. Featured are new media for visual and audio recreations including floor to ceiling projections of live Strike footage, original Strike artifacts, historical graphics, new mannequins, and a new Strike documentary.

Taking its title from a phrase uttered by Manitoba's illustrious Premier, Sir Rodmond Roblin, during a heated exchange with Nellie McClung, "Nice Women Don't Want the Vote" is an exhibition that was developed by the Manitoba Museum to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of Manitoba women winning the right to vote on January 28, 1916. The exhibition ended its crosscountry tour to locations throughout Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Ontario, and Quebec (including the Canadian Museum of History) and has been enjoyed by more than 70,000 visitors. The exhibition concluded with a stay at the Manitoba Legislative building, which was fitting as its patron was Her Honour, Janice Filmon, Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba.

# INTERNAL TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

**ALLOWAY HALL** 

Manitoba: Heart of Hockey July 6, 2018 – January 13, 2019 Guest Curator: Candace Hogue

This exhibition showcased artifacts and stories centred on themes of diversity, rural communities, professional hockey, and "the dream." Artifacts included material from the early 1890s and featured all-star treasures and stories from across Manitoba.

### **URBAN GALLERY AND CORRIDOR**

Strike 1919: Divided City
March 22, 2019 – January 5, 2020
Commemoration of the 100th
anniversary of the Winnipeg General

Strike was presented in the Urban Gallery telling the story of a city divided. Digital architectural projections of Strike scenes, artifacts, photographs, archival interviews, and audio creations of conversations populate the space, placing visitors at the epicenter of a city divided.

### **DISCOVERY ROOM**

Vikings of the First World War: Icelandic Canadians in Service October 26, 2018 – March 3, 2019

This community exhibition brought forward stories along with medals, photographs, letters, and other artifacts loaned from the community. Included was a multimedia video installation, *To Pluck a Flower from this Peculiar Place*, an external multi-media exhibition curated by Kristin Maria Hreinsdottir in collaboration with the National Museum of Iceland and the University of Iceland.

### **MUSEUM FOYER**

Finding the Impossible: Unique Tropical Fossils from William Lake, Manitoba May 7 – October 28, 2018

This small case showcased magnificent fossils and accompanying video and featured a behind-the-scenes look at the research and collecting methodology.

In Flanders Fields: How We Remember October 30, 2018 – January 11, 2019

Commemorating the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War and the beginning of Armistice Day, this exhibit also featured a digital media display of the names of soldiers who died in 1918 in a video by the non-profit group The World Remembers.

Shattered Past: New Clues in the Mystery of an Ancient Pot January 11 — September 29, 2019

This case features a ceramic reconstruction of a vessel recovered in 1996 from the banks of the Winnipeg River. This pot is significant since much of the vessel was recovered, and obsidian (volcanic glass) flakes found beside the pot inform us about early trade. It showcased

the specialized ceramic reconstruction of a unique and rare vessel carried out by Canadian Conservation Institute.

# INCOMING TRAVELLING EXHIBITIONS

HOCKEY: The Stories Behind Our Passion July 6, 2018 – January 13, 2019


Developed by the Canadian Museum of History, Hockey: The Stories Behind Our Passion explored the importance and influence of hockey, providing visitors with a social and historical look through the past 100 years, bringing the history of the game to life for both professional and amateur levels. This exhibition was augmented by our own Manitoba: Heart of Hockey exhibition.

Museum's Choice: Fossil Favourites from Across Canada March 8 – May 26, 2019

Developed by The Alliance of Natural History Museums of Canada, in partnership with the Canadian Museum of Nature and the Royal British Columbia Museum, this travelling exhibition showcased some of Canada's most famous and significant fossils. The Manitoba Museum is both a contributing partner (world's largest trilobite) and venue for this exhibition that was produced for Canada's 150th anniversary and is touring nationally over a three-year period.

# **PROGRAMS & INTERPRETATION**

THE MANITOBA MUSEUM IS THE PROVINCE'S LARGEST CENTRE FOR HERITAGE and science learning, providing public programs as well as interpretive programs for schools and education groups. Over the 2018-19 year over 1,500 visitors enjoyed paid public programs (After Hours, From Talk to Table, etc.) and nearly 80,000 student visits for school programs were recorded. As well, Birthday Parties, Summer Day Camps, and MuZZZeum Sleepovers continue to engage our community. And thousands of visitors enjoyed programs that enhance their experiences including science demonstration, boarding the *Nonsuch*, interpretive stations with furs and fossils, and much more.

# MUSEUM GALLERIES PROGRAMS

The Learning & Engagement team had an extremely successful year in the realm of public programs, finding new ways to engage diverse communities with the Museum's spectacular collections as well as supporting the featured exhibition, Hockey: The Stories Behind Our Passion. Visitors to the Hockey exhibition got to try on vintage hockey gear, then create a digital all-star hockey card which could be shared on social media. The Museum also offered hockey-themed Birthday Parties and Hat Trick Parties for hockey teams.

Museum workshops highlighting Indigenous collections were particularly well-received this year, with over 100 participants taking part in half-day, fullday, and multi-day workshops. Master beader Jennine Krauchi offered three sold-out Introductory Beading workshops and two introductory Quillwork workshops. The workshops began with a behind-the-scenes visit to the collections, with Curator of Cultural Anthropology Dr. Maureen Matthews sharing the cultural and historic importance of the art forms. We also partnered with Mark Blieske who led a Birch Bark Basket Making workshop, supplemented with a special visit to the Museum's Custer Collection of birch bark baskets and other artifacts. A mitten-making workshop was held in partnership with Alan Easter and the Seven Oaks House Museum, and a moccasin-making workshop was led by Cynthia Boehm. During Cynthia's workshop, we were fortunate to see

collections from Norway House, made by Cynthia's great-grandmother. This connection highlighted the importance of these workshops and the ways in which they inspire meaning-making for individuals and the community.

The Welcome to Treaty 1 program continues to grow in popularity for professional development; over 250 participants, including social workers, nurses, bank employees, and municipal, provincial, and federal government workers, took part this year. We continue to create new video involving our community partners in the ongoing evolution of the program.

To celebrate the opening of the new Nonsuch Gallery and the Planetarium's 50th Anniversary, we planned an exciting collaboration with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. Resident

Conductor Julian Pellicano planned a program that highlighted the era of the original 17th-entury *Nonsuch* voyage, and for the Planetarium, a program that transported listeners into the stars and beyond our galaxy.

The re-opening of the new Nonsuch Gallery drove visitors to the annual Nonsuch Hold Tours during the winter holidays. Over 4,400 visitors lined up for a rare chance to see the mysterious cargo hold. On a related note, we brought back our From Talk to Table series for a special partnership tour with Nonsuch Brewing Co. The sold-out tour, Untold Stories of the Nonsuch, featured rarely-told stories of the Hudson's Bay Company with Assistant Curator Cortney Pachet.

We also welcomed a new program for our youngest visitors, babies! Museum Babies engages those who can sit but cannot yet walk in hands-on programming aimed to stimulate curiosity and learning.

Two new events in our After Hours series proved popular. The Grown-up Field Trip took adult participants on a journey back to their school days as they aimed to complete all the tasks on their "report card." We brought out our most-popular school program activities, including our soapstone workshop and "carrot mummies" activity, and set up a photo booth for participants to recreate their best awkward school photos. For Valentine's Day we offered Wild Romance. Featuring talks and activities by our Natural History Curators Dr. Diana Robson and Dr. Randy Mooi, participants learned how to perform elaborate mating rituals, how plants can reproduce without moving, and how animals use horns to "woo" their mates. Other activities included tango lessons by Tango Salon Winnipeg and a DIY craft station.

# PLANETARIUM & SCIENCE GALLERY PROGRAMS

The Planetarium launched its 50th anniversary with a VIP event on May 12, 2018. Current and past Planetarium staff were in attendance, and several former

staff sent remarks and best wishes on the occasion. A display of Planetarium posters from the past 50 years was on display in the Science Gallery throughout the spring.

The Planetarium also brought back laser shows to celebrate its 50th anniversary. Music-based shows with lasers and the DIGISTAR full-dome video entranced visitors with programs featuring Pink Floyd, Queen, Stranger Things, and other classic rock music.

Another nod to the past was the updated version of *In My Backyard* with Fred Penner. This beloved children's planetarium show, popular in the 1990s, was given new life using the DIGISTAR system. A new generation of children can now discover the wonders they can see in their own backyard, and sing along with the timeless songs of Fred Penner. Other new shows included *LIFE: A Cosmic Story*, narrated by Jody Foster, which explored the diversity of life on earth and the cosmic conditions which make it possible.

Special programs were a major theme of the year's activities. The Planetarium also launched its Dark Matters series of programs, which pairs a Planetarium show and a guest scientist with a reception in the Science Gallery. Astronomy and telescope workshops continue to be popular.

The Science Gallery featured exciting science demonstrations in the Explore Science Zone over the winter holidays which were greatly enjoyed by visitors. It was also a secondary venue for those parents attending the Wild Romance After Hours party, providing a family dance party in the Science Gallery. A Saturday in Space series welcomed speakers that featured new and exciting achievements in space science in Manitoba.

# **MEMBERSHIP**

The Museum's membership program continues to be very popular. At yearend, our member family consisted of 12,889 individuals. Members holding Family memberships remained the majority at 71%. In addition to unlimited admission to the Museum Galleries, Science Gallery, and Planetarium, members enjoyed discounts on programs such as Summer Day Camps, Birthday Parties, Workshops, and After Hours events. Members also took advantage of their discount in the Museum Shop.

In 2018-2019, the Museum hosted three exclusive member events. The line-up included a preview event to kick-start the opening of our feature exhibition Hockey: The Stories Behind Our Passion. In September the Museum held a member and donor appreciation event featuring a panel discussion with the curators of the newly renovated Nonsuch Gallery which provided fascinating insights into the thought processes behind the creation of exhibits. The annual Members' Halloween Night in October continues to be one of our most popular events welcoming over 900 attendees.

# **COLLECTIONS AND CONSERVATION**

T THE CORE OF THE MANITOBA MUSEUM'S MISSION IS THE EXTENSIVE COLLECTION of artifacts and specimens developed, documented, and cared for by a team of curators, conservators, and collections staff. The Museum also maintains a library and institutional archive, including an ever-growing collection of contemporary oral histories.

The Museum's collections are a rich and diverse representation of the province's human and natural history. Collections are divided into overarching disciplines: the Human History collection is comprised of Archaeology, Cultural Anthropology, History, and the Hudson's Bay Company Museum Collection; and the Natural History collection includes

Botany, Geology and Paleontology, and Zoology. The irreplaceable content from the collections is used in exhibitions, education, and research not only by Museum staff, but a variety of individuals and groups in local, national, and international communities.

### **COLLECTIONS MANAGEMENT**

In 2018-2019, **5,502** artifacts and specimens were added to the Museum's collections in Human and Natural History:

• Archaeology: 2,252 artifacts

• Botany: 43 specimens

• Cultural Anthropology: 42 artifacts

 Geology/Paleontology: 1,081 specimens

• **History:** 667 artifacts

• HBC Museum Collection: 89 artifacts

Zoology: 1,273 specimens

With these new additions, the Museum collection consists of **2,866,668** objects. Collections staff also created, updated,

and enriched more than **400,000** database records that link historical and scientific data with the physical object.

### **LOANS**

Thirty-five new incoming and outgoing loan agreements were put in place during 2018-2019.

### **INCOMING LOAN HIGHLIGHTS**

- A bronze maquette of Sir William Stephenson from Gary Solar, President of The Intrepid Society was included in the temporary exhibition Vikings of the First World War.
- A number of objects from the personal collection of Joe Martin were included in the Vikings of the First World War temporary exhibition.
- Flanders field dried poppy from the Royal Winnipeg Rifles Museum and Archives was included in the temporary exhibition In Flanders Fields: How We Remember.

· A Lewis machine gun from the Royal Canadian Artillery Museum was included in the temporary exhibition Strike 1919: Divided City.

 Two handguns and one long gun from the Fort Garry Horse Museum and Archives were included in the temporary exhibition Strike 1919: Divided City.

### **OUTGOING LOAN HIGHLIGHTS**

- Four Mennonite clocks from the History collection were loaned to the Mennonite Heritage Village for their temporary exhibition The Art of Mennonite Clocks.
- Nine unidentified flea specimens from the Zoology collection were loaned to the University of Manitoba for continuing research of mammal ectoparasites.
- · A cradleboard from the Cultural Anthropology collection was loaned to the Canadian Museum for Human Rights to be included in their exhibition on the Indian Act.
- A gutskin rain jacket from the HBC Museum Collection was loaned to be a part of the exhibition Soundings: Sound Art and Social Practice, organized by the Agnes Etherington Art Centre at Queen's University.

### **CONSERVATION**

The Conservation Department is responsible for ensuring the long-term preservation of the Museum's collections by mitigating deterioration before it begins, and responding to damage if required. In the past year, more than 40 objects were treated in the conservation lab, and 850 condition assessments were completed. Conservation staff also completed the assessment, treatment, and mounting of artifacts and specimens for 10 temporary and permanent exhibitions. Seven new conservationquality mannequins were purchased, mounted, and installed in the Urban Gallery for Strike 1919: A Divided City to update and improve the interpretation and immersive experience for the visitor.

Conservation Institute (CCI), the RE-ORG: Canada (Prairies and North), a hands-on workshop and conference about collections storage reorganization. More than 25 participants had the opportunity to learn and apply the RE-ORG principals to three of the Museum's collections storage areas; resulting benefits include increased storage capacity and improvement to collections care in those spaces.


### SPECIMEN PREPARATION


Specimens in the natural history collections often require preparation by specialists prior to being used for research, exhibition, or placed into storage. Key activities in 2018-2019 included:

- 280 herbarium specimens mounted
- 70 insects pinned
- 10 herpetological specimens preserved
- 31 small mammal, large mammal and bird skeletons prepared
- 102 bird and mammal study skins prepared
- 50 thin-section fossil jellyfish specimens prepared
- 10 lithographic specimens prepared
- 35 fossil specimens prepared

### **ACQUISITION HIGHLIGHTS BOTANY**

- 17 ferns and lycophytes from the Bloodvein/Berens Rivers of Manitoba were donated by Dr. Richard Staniforth. These specimens are from an underexplored part of the province, and greatly improves knowledge of the distribution and range of these species in Manitoba.
- 286 flowering plants, three lichens, and one moss from various parks and conservation areas in southern Manitoba collected by the Curator of Botany. These specimens, some rare or

uncommon, fill gaps in the collection and help us understand how plant communities have changed over time.

### **CULTURAL ANTHROPOLOGY**

- An ivory tea gown (1900s) made entirely of lace, that belonged to Mrs. Edith (McTavish) Rogers. Edith grew up in Norway House in a Cree Métis family and was the first woman elected to the Manitoba Legislature; four years after women won the right to vote. To be included in the new Winnipeg Gallery.
- Margaret Fayant Collection (1850-1980). Handwork and women's sewing equipment that spans the lives of four generations of Métis women. The collection includes beaded dancing moccasins, a beaded wall pocket, as well as the hand embroidered blue wool needle case these women used to make these beautiful objects. To be included in the Ste. Madeleine story in the Parklands Gallery.
- Carved and painted cradleboard, hand embroidery (mid 1900s) belonged to Dinah Beardy, a friend of Dr. Menno Wiebe who wrote the first "sketch" of the Oji-Cree (Aninshininiwag) language. Mrs. Beardy gave the cradleboard to Dr. Wiebe as a gift when he completed this work. The last baby to occupy the cradleboard was artist Jackson Beardy. To be included as part of the Jackson Beardy story in the Boreal Forest Gallery.





- A substantial collection of Canadian minerals was donated. These 30 specimens, many of them large and beautiful, represent classic Canadian mineral-collecting localities such as Mont St-Hilaire (Québec) and Pine Point (Northwest Territories).
- A suite of fossils of Devonian age
   (about 380 million years old) was
   collected from the Manitoba Interlake
   in collaboration with the Manitoba
   Geological Survey and Canadian
   Fossil Discovery Centre. The collected
   material includes a large bony plate
   (head shield) from an armoured fish,
   and several corals.
- A collection of 15 industrial-grade diamonds was donated to the collection.
   These specimens, from various global localities, will form a useful reference suite.
- Several Pleistocene (Ice Age) bones from southeastern Manitoba were received by donation. These include a mammoth tooth, a portion of a mammoth tusk, and bison bones.

### **HBC MUSEUM COLLECTION**

 A collection of beading and photographs that belonged to one-time Hudson's Bay Company employee George Fowlie was donated. Fowlie entered into service with HBC in 1923 working at York Factory. He worked in Canada until the early 1930s, often sending beadwork back to his mother in Aberdeen, Scotland. To be included in a New Acquisitions Case.  Collection of miniature portraits, books, and other objects donated by the family of William G. Konantz, son of politician Margaret MacTavish Rogers Konantz and grandson of Edith MacTavish Rogers, Manitoba's first woman MLA. The portrait subjects include longtime HBC Governor Sir George Simpson, his sister Maria Simpson, and his cousin Thomas Sinclair.

### HISTORY

- The Eckhardt-Grammaté collection features the personal items of German Expressionist painter Walter Grammaté, composer Sophie Carmen Eckhardt-Grammaté, and Ferdinand Eckhardt, former director of the Winnipeg Art Gallery. The artifacts represent their lives and work in Russia, France, Germany, Spain, Austria, and Canada, from the 1890s to the 1970s. Objects include death masks, original Grammaté prints, 17th-century Spanish furniture, photographs, clothing, silent practice keyboards, and much more.
- The Tupper Quilt, a crazy quilt made in Winnipeg in 1889 by Ada Tupper, daughter-in-law of Sir Charles Tupper, former Prime Minister of Canada. The quilt tells of the story of Charles and Frances Tupper, and the families of their four children. It was part of the

- Legacies of Confederation exhibition in 2017 for Canada 150.
- The roll-top desk of William Forbes Alloway, dating to the 1870s used at the Champion and Alloway Bank, and later given to Alloway's employee George Waight. The desk includes a secret locking mechanism. To be included in the Winnipeg Gallery.

- A single sheet of baleen over 2.5 metres long from a bowhead whale (Balaena mysticetus) of Arctic waters, a species sometimes seen along the Manitoba coast. This is the first specimen of baleen in the collection that is from an identified species and location.
- Several mammal specimens were obtained for taxidermy. These include a coyote (Canis latrans) that will be mounted leaping after grouse, several Richardson's ground squirrels (Urocitellus richardsonii) that will be shown in a burrow cross-section to illustrate their life history, and a badger (Taxidea taxus). To be featured in the renewed Grasslands Gallery.
- Over 50 beetles were donated that included several species rarely collected in the province from areas not previously represented in the research collection.

# RESEARCH


THE MANITOBA MUSEUM'S MANDATE IS TO STUDY THE HUMAN AND NATURAL HISTORY of the province. To this end, the curators travel across Manitoba to carry out primary research, including biological, paleontological, and archaeological field studies, and consult with the diverse communities of the province. Collaboration with other university and museum researchers, Indigenous peoples, and community groups across Canada and around the world, allow the Museum to greatly expand its reach, and also provides an important avenue for partnerships and inclusion in its work.

The Museum carries out considerable specimen-based and archaeological research: preparing, studying, measuring, photographing, and analyzing important objects in the collections. Artifact-based collections also require in-depth research and are supported by oral histories, community stories and collaboration, and historical study. Research results are shared through both scholarly and popular publications, and are dispersed more widely through various media including blogs and websites, public lectures, community gatherings, interviews, temporary and permanent exhibitions, and contribute to discourse on public policy.

The Museum's curatorial team continues research for the *Bringing Our Stories Forward* Gallery Renewal Project with a focus on content related to the new Winnipeg Gallery, and includes collaboration with the Indigenous

Advisory Circle and the Community Engagement Team of Newcomers to Winnipeg. Additional work is under way for the Grasslands Gallery renewal as well.

### Stories of the Old Ones

Final research was conducted for the book Dibaajimindwaa Geteyaag: Ogiiyose, Noojigiigoo'iwe gaye Dibinawaag Nibiing Onji / Stories of the Old Ones: Hunter and Fisher from Sheltered Water.
The research project was the result of collaboration with the Sagkeeng Anicinabe Government, the late Elder Mark Thompson and curator/artist, Jaimie Isaac. The book is written for a general audience and weaves Indigenous knowledge with human and natural history.

### Six Seasons of the Asiniskow Ithiniwak

The Curator co-lead an archaeology team for this Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Partnership Grant that was awarded in 2017. The focus this year was on research and cataloguing collections from a large Late Woodland

campsite located on Gauer River. A research trip to Ottawa was taken to examine archaeological and ethnographic collections from northern Manitoba at the Canadian Museum of History.

### **BOTANY**

### DR. DIANA BIZECKI ROBSON

### Historic Plant Tracking

The Curator conducted 14 days of field work to search for historically-collected species of plants in southern Manitoba. Several species were located in the provincial parks and conservation areas visited. Additionally, a review of the Museum's 3,300 specimens of grass was undertaken to ensure correct and up-to-date identification.

### Identification of Mixed-grass Prairie Plant Species for Pollinator Habitat Enhancement

This project, conducted in partnership with the Nature Conservancy of Canada, entailed documenting plant-pollinator interactions at Yellow Quill Prairie Preserve in southwestern Manitoba. The data from this preserve was compared to that from other preserves visited previously, and the results published in the National Research Council journal, Botany.

### Strategic Botanical Collecting

Several field trips to obtain specimens of 290 plants were made to Spruce Woods, Turtle Mountain, Grand Beach and Patricia Beach Provincial Parks, and various other locales in southwestern Manitoba. These additions help fill gaps in the collection, and will be useful for assessing the status of plants in Manitoba.

### **CULTURAL ANTHROPOLOGY**

### Shaataahaa: Great Lakes Research Alliance for the Study of Indigenous Arts and Culture (GRASAC) research

With collaborators, Dr. Sherry Farrell Racette of the University of Regina, and Mary Deleary and Dr. Jessie Ryker Crawford of Institute for American Indian Art (IAIA) in Santa Fe, New Mexico, this research was undertaken as a pilot project with GRASAC, a collaborative database group based out of the University of Toronto. Modelled on the Manitoba Museum's Indigenous Scholars in Residence program, we tested similar methodologies at IAIA using collections as teachers or "elder objects."

### McKay School Repatriation Project

This SSHRC funded project, led by anthropologist Dr. Andrea Walsh, of the University of Victoria, provides facilitation for the repatriation of 80 works of art from British Columbia to Manitoba. These drawings were created over 50 years ago by young Manitobans who were at the McKay Residential School at Dauphin. Bringing the paintings home involves

facing painful memories of these schools and the terrible harms experienced by the former students. Dr. Matthews and Dr. Shelly Sweeney of the University of Manitoba Archives helped by participating in these sessions, and have worked together since to assist the students in sourcing funds to prepare for the repatriation.

# GEOLOGY & PALEONTOLOGY

# The Fossil Record of Jellyfish (Cnidarian Medusae)

A labour intensive process is being used to create microscope slides of fossil jellyfish from the William Lake site, Grand Rapids Uplands. Using instruments at Brandon University chemical analysis will be undertaken to determine what elements these remarkable fossils are made of, and how they were formed. The Curator also spent time at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science, working with Dr. James Hagadorn, carrying out research and preparing manuscripts about the jellyfish fossil record.

### Geology Research for the Grasslands Gallery

Geological knowledge features in several of the themes for the Gallery renewal project, most notably exhibits about fieldstone and about rivers in the Grasslands region. Selected sites were visited and photographed, gathering information about rivers and river valleys in autumn 2018.

### Analysis of Burial at Schoenfeld, Manitoba

The Curator collaborated on the research of the skeletal remains of a Mennonite woman recovered from a disturbed burial site in southeastern Manitoba, providing background historical context to the settlement and the prevalence of glanders, a disease of horses that can be transmitted to humans. The goal of the research was to determine the possibility of diagnosing glanders infection through human skeletal remains, and the historical context of infection.

The Curator conducted research on the Winnipeg General Strike, Icelandic Canadians involved in the First World War, and Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae, author of *In Flanders Fields*, in preparation for related exhibitions.

### **HBC MUSEUM COLLECTION**

### Southwest Manitoba Fur Trade Posts

The Curator embarked on a field survey with Dr. Scott Hamilton from Lakehead University over four days during the summer to explore known trading post locations that ranged from early French posts, HBC, and Northwest Company. Some locations were relatively easy to access, off provincial roads; others required bushwhacking through muskeg and navigating around newly developed beaver ponds. This work supports Grasslands Gallery renewal.

### York Factory Project

The Museum has renewed a partnership agreement to continue to collaborate with Parks Canada and York Factory First Nation on the eventual redevelopment of the York Factory exhibition, which will be part of a multi-year project to upgrade Arctic/Subarctic Gallery.

# Systematics and Biogeography of Percomorph Fishes

Two papers are being prepared that each include the description of a species new to science in the gobiid genus Callogobius, and another will explore the evolutionary relationships within the genus based on morphological and molecular characteristics.

### Diversity and Historical Biogeography of Amphibians and Reptiles in Manitoba

Papers are in preparation on spring peeper (Pseudacris crucifer) and treefrog (Hyla versicolor) distributions, as well as toad (Anaxyrus) hybrid zones. Fieldwork planned for the extreme southwest of the province on two species, Great Plains toad (Anaxyrus cognatus) and Plains spadefoot toad (Spea bombifrons), will inform the Bringing Our Stories Forward Capital Renewal Project.

### Manitoba Breeding Bird Atlas

The online publication has been completed including 312 species accounts with maps of breeding evidence, relative abundance and probability of observation (http://www.birdatlas.mb.ca/accounts/toc.jsp?lang=en). The Atlas is a valuable resource for conservation and environmental monitoring, the product of a partnership among Bird Studies Canada, Environment Canada, Manitoba Sustainable Development, Nature Conservancy Canada, and the Manitoba Museum. It is the largest ever citizen science volunteer effort in Manitoba with over 1,000 participants.

# CURATORS EMERITI DR. KATHERINE PETTIPAS

### DR. KATTIERINE FETTIFA

### Walter Rudnicki Cartoons

Dr. Pettipas completed research on a large collection of political cartoons produced by former Winnipegger Walter Rudnicki and has submitted a manuscript for consideration of publication to the University of Manitoba Press titled "Humourist, Public Servant, Indigenous Rights Activist, 1945-2008."

### Anoee's World

The Curator is also working on a major manuscript titled "Anoee's World: The Art of a Young Kivallirmiut (Caribou Inuit) in the 1930s." This nearly completed research focuses on drawings and artifacts acquired by Bishop Donald B. Marsh in the 1920s and 1930s. As part of this project, Dr. Pettipas is working with Eric Anoee Jr. on his father's drawing history.

# Reconciliation of Anthropological Documentary Fieldwork Collections

In partnership with the Director of Special Collections and Archives at the University of Manitoba, Dr. Pettipas is researching the issue of reconciliation of anthropological documentary fieldwork collections and originating Indigenous communities. A research paper featuring the Indigenous pipe collection of Henry Youle Hind, mid-1850s at the New Brunswick Museum, has been completed for publication.

### DR. LEIGH SYMS

### The Lockport Village Site

Lockport Village is an ancient archaeological site which includes the most outstanding record of Precontact farming in western Canada. The project, which began in 2016, includes extensive state of the art analyses, the development of numerous highly illustrated reports, plus a television documentary.

# Compilation of Local First Nations Plant Domestication

First Nations groups have nurtured and domesticated many plants over thousands of years. These make up many local food resources and some local technological developments (cotton, rubber). While the Three Sisters – corn, beans, and squash – are widely known, others like sweet passion fruit and dragon fruit are not. This list is being compiled to educate the public of the important contribution First Nations farmers made to the overall health of all people.

# **VOLUNTEERS**

THE GOAL OF THE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM AT THE MANITOBA MUSEUM is to create a diverse and inclusive environment. This past year we continued to engage many segments of our population, including high school and post-secondary students, retirees, new immigrants, and community support groups.

We engaged our volunteers in a diversity survey and learned that they identifed with 35 different cultural backgrounds, claimed citizenship in 14 countries other than Canada, and were comfortable speaking well enough to carry on a conversation in 20 languages other than English. Of those who responded to the survey, 32% identify as women, 14.5% as visible minorities, and 8% as persons with disabilities.

This year, 127 new volunteers joined our program, which was an increase of 19% over last year. We hosted 21 students throughout the organization for internships, work placements, and job shadows involving students from Red River College Language Program, The University of Winnipeg's PACE Program for Human Resource Management and their Canadian Work Experience Program for international students, The University of Manitoba's Extended Education

Program, Manitoba Institute of Trades and Technology (MITT), and four high schools. Volunteer program presentations were made for Hotel and Hospitality students at MITT and for new immigrants participating in the Manitoba Start Entry program. We continued our successful partnerships with Transcona Springfield Employment Network and Community Ventures assisting adults with disabilities to gain employment experience.

The Museum acknowledges the skills our volunteers bring and their commitment to supporting us. In turn, this past year, 15 of our active and past volunteers were hired for term or contract positions as Visitor Services Associates, Sleepover Leaders, Day Camp Leaders, Event Support Assistants, and a Hockey Exhibit Attendant.



Whether it was through the Youth Access, which creates an environment of inclusion for children and youth; welcoming newcomers to Manitoba through Call it Home; or opening the doors for all Manitobans through Community Access, 36,635 Museum visits, including 8,600 during our free Manitoba Day celebrations, took place thanks to the generous supporters of this initiative.

The Manitoba Museum Foundation Incorporated was established in 1996 to develop an endowment and administer grants to the Manitoba Museum in support of exhibit replacement, research projects, collections acquisitions and special projects.

In September of 2008, The Manitoba Museum Foundation Incorporated transferred one million dollars of its endowment fund to create The Manitoba Museum Foundation Fund at The Winnipeg Foundation. The Manitoba Museum continues to benefit from The Winnipeg Foundation's experience in managing endowment assets.

It is the practice of the Manitoba Museum to move any bequests, in memoriam, and donations directed by donors as endowment gifts to The Manitoba Museum Foundation. Donors also have the option to donate directly to The Manitoba Museum Foundation Fund through The Winnipeg Foundation where gifts will be matched by The Winnipeg Foundation one dollar for every nine dollars donated.

Annually, income from the Fund at The Winnipeg Foundation and funds from The Manitoba Museum Foundation are pooled to create an annual grant budget for research projects, exhibit replacement,

collections acquisitions and special projects. In fiscal year 2018-2019, four research grants were awarded totaling \$20,650. Four exhibit replacement grants were awarded, totaling \$31,350, and one Special Project totaling \$15,000.



Note: Excludes properties (fixed assets) and special project restricted funds.




The Manitoba Museum is supported through a variety of revenue streams – from public funds to earned and fundraised. The Government of Manitoba provided 54% of the Museum's annual funding, supporting core operations including care of the Province's collection of 2.9 million artifacts and specimens, original research, exhibition development, and educational programs.

Stable public funding enables the Museum to reach out to the community from a position of strength to leverage private sector support and ensure accessibility to the Museum for all Manitobans. Fundraised revenues comprised 13% of all revenues, and represent numerous corporate partners and many individual contributors who help ensure the Museum remains sustainable.

Earned revenue is generated from: admissions, including Alloway World Exhibitions; membership fees; the Museum Shop; ticketed programs such as After Hours, Workshops, Sleepovers, and Birthday Parties; as well as, fee-for-service conservation contracts and speaking fees.

The Museum relies upon a highly educated and skilled workforce whose salaries and benefits have been allocated to appropriate areas.

A majority of community funding is dedicated to the Museum's core activities of research, collections and exhibitions and represents 29% of expenditures. This area includes curatorial research and conservation activities as well as exhibitions. Many special research and exhibition projects are accomplished with one-time grants (externally restricted projects) and are not reflected above.

The Museum incurs significant costs associated with "keeping the doors open." Central services comprise 19% of expenditures supporting the overall infrastructure (computer systems, insurance, gallery maintenance and design, bank charges, and administrative support).

Whether a student with a school group, a family visiting on the weekend, or a tour group from abroad, the visitor experience is a top priority and represents 17% of expenses (including materials and programs staff for the Museum Galleries, Planetarium, and Science Gallery).

The Museum has a revitalized public programs area and exciting annual exhibitions designed to grow and develop new audiences. This is accomplished through marketing and communications. At 15% of expenses, the Marketing, Visitor Services & Membership area includes: advertising (leveraged by sponsorship), public relations, design, as well as box office, visitor amenities, and membership.
